HOMEWORK

'Children of the Revolution'

This term we will be working on a project that explores the following areas of the curriculum:

Literacy - Recounts and newspapers

Art - Drawing and print making

Geography - Land use

History - Victorian Britain

ICT - Research

PSHE - Empathy

D & T - Print making

This topic has a history focus and teaches the children about the Victorian era including the lives of the rich and poor and other significant social and moral changes of the 19th century.

In this project the children will learn:

- about the Victorian era;
- about the social, moral and technological issues of the day;
- about the important people of the day including those who influenced and made changes;
- about the literature of the day and how it was used to entertain and inform;
- how to write a range of reports;
- about the differences between childhood in the present day and Victorian time.
