Dogs Trust neutering

Dog's trust changes from March 1st 2016

From March 1st, there will be changes to the dogs trust low cost neutering scheme.

The contribution price paid by owners will be increasing to £35..

Dogs trust will also be limiting the types of breeds that they will neuter. The only breeds covered will be:

Staffordshire Bull Terrier

Mastiff

Rottweiler

American Bull Dog

Greyhound

Lurcher

Akita

Husky

Malamute

German

Shepherd

Samoyed

Jack Russell Terrier

Collie

Crossbreeds - where the primary breed is identifiable as one of those listed here.



Low cost neutering is available to anyone receiving means tested benefits. These include:

Jobseekers allowance, child tax credit, working tax credit, housing benefit, council tax reduction/council tax support and pension credit.

If you are eligible for low cost neutering you will need to show proof of benefit and bring photo ID.

FARM DOG NEUTERING CHANGES

Dog owners neutering their pet using a farm holding number will now need to pay a contribution of £35, and only the breeds list above are eligible.

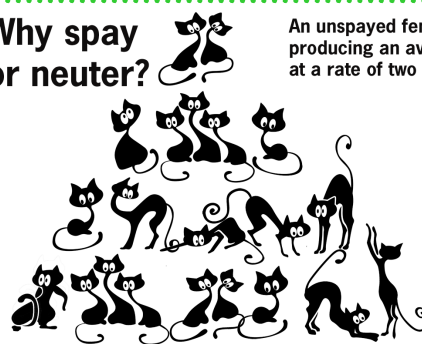
Cats Protection neutering

You pay a £5 contribution, and Cats Protection will pay the rest! All you need to do is show proof of means tested benefits, and your cat can be neutered and micro chipped for £5!

Why spay or neuter?



An unsprayed female cat, her mate, and their offspring producing an average of 2.8 surviving kittens per litter at a rate of two litters a year adds up quickly.

1 year: 12 cats
2 years: 67 cats
3 years: 376 cats
4 years: 2107 cats
5 years: 11801 cats
6 years: 66,088 cats
7 years: 370,092 cats
8 years: 2,072,514 cats
9 years, 11,606,077 cats

Spaying or neutering one cat saves many lives.
